Contractor Verification Service

Woodside's Contractor Verification Service (CVS) is integral to keeping our people safe by ensuring that our contractors are appropriately certified for the work they perform onsite.

What is CVS?

CVS is used to monitor contractors working on Woodside facilities are appropriately certified for the roles they perform on site.

When do contractors need to be registered in CVS?

All contract organisations must ensure their personnel are registered and meet their CVS role requirements at least six weeks prior to travelling to site.

As of December 2015 site access for contractors not registered in CVS will not be permitted until registration is complete and the relevant qualifications have been verified by CVS.

Supplying Materials Safely to Site

Our materials are transported, stored and handled in harsh environments. This requires freight to be prepared properly to avoid safety and environmental risks. Under the chain of responsibility, Woodside, its suppliers and logistics providers, have a legal obligation to ensure that all reasonable steps are taken to prevent legislative breaches.

To address this, Woodside has updated the [Freight Preparation Standard](#) and developed a companion handbook.



Suppliers are expected to use their own systems and methods while complying with relevant regulations and standards and mandatory requirements in Woodside's Standard. **Compliance to the Woodside Standard is mandatory from 1 February 2016.**

Supplier Forum

On 9 November 2015, Woodside hosted over 35 major suppliers at its annual Operations Supplier Forum. The forum sought to promote continuous improvement in all aspects of our business under the theme of 'Building Outstanding Relationships'. The day comprised of a series of presentations from Woodside executives and several suppliers that profiled their improvement journey with Woodside. Four breakout sessions to promote knowledge sharing, learning and discussion were run during the day. The topics were

- Continuous Improvement,
- Health & Safety,
- Innovation & Technology and
- Sustainability



A number of common themes emerged across the breakout sessions. Improvement areas included integrated planning, data sharing, standardisation of practices and requirements (both across Woodside assets and across industry), as well as better coordination of activities across health & safety and local content. It was also identified that having a shared picture of success and common metrics would help Woodside to build outstanding relationships with suppliers.

The feedback and insights from the forum will be used to inform improvement opportunities for 2016, however recognise that by working collaboratively with our suppliers we will be able to achieve significant improvements in our Operations as part of our journey to Outstanding performance.

Connect WA 2015 Conference – 9 Nov 2015

Supply Nation held their 3rd Connect WA 2015 Conference in Perth on 9 November 2015, which focussed on 'Growth through Diversity'. The annual event provides an opportunity for both corporate and government buyer representatives to network and collaborate with a range of Indigenous businesses to further assist with the ongoing integration of Indigenous suppliers into our supply chains. Woodside sponsored the networking breakfast and showcased a video on our Electrical Equipment in Hazardous Area contract awards to three Indigenous electrical businesses.
